President's Message

Ronald P. Abeles

Back to the future

In my Spring Message, I highlighted several recent reports from the National Academy of Sciences recommending directions for behavioral and social sciences research supported by the National Institutes of Health (NIH). To a major degree, these recommendations call for interdisciplinary, multilevel studies employing a lifespan approach. Such research may depend upon complex, unique, and potentially expensive data sets, making the "single-use" model of data problematic and inefficient. By "single-use," I am referring to data that an investigator or a team of investigators collect for their own exclusive use. Once they have finished with their initial research for which the data were collected, the data may be shelved and locked up until, if and when, the investigators think of additional questions and/or analyses to which the data are relevant.

Five years ago, the growing complexity and cost of aging research led the National Institute on Aging (NIA) to

develop a policy for sharing and archiving of behavioral and social science research data characterized as "unique resources" (i.e., not easily or inexpensively collectable or replicable). The NIA's National Advisory Council on Aging approved the policy, and NIA submitted it for publication in the *NIH Guide to Grants and Contracts*. Although NIH already had in place analogous policies for some kinds of biomedical data, the proposed NIA policy statement raised the stakes and had implications for other NIH institutes and their extramural and intramural research programs. Consequently, NIH officials established a committee to consider whether or not (and how) the NIA policy might be broadened to encompass all of NIH.

The NIA policy was never published. It died in committee. At least, it seemed to have. Actually, it was just hibernating, only to awake gradually over the past year or so and to emerge as a trans-NIH policy applicable to all NIH-funded research, not just aging, extramural, or behavioral and social science research. grants2.nih.gov/grants/policy/data_sharing/index.htm.) In brief, probably starting in September 2002, the NIH will expect investigators supported by NIH funding to make their research data available to the scientific community for subsequent analyses. Researchers will need to address data sharing in grant applications, and NIH will consider data sharing plans in the review of applications. Funds for sharing or archiving data may be requested in the original grant application or as a supplement to an existing grant.

However, the NIH policy also recognizes that in some par-

From the Liaison to the Board of Educational Affairs

APA's Board of Educational Affairs is sponsor of a national Education Leadership Conference intended to be an annual event. The first meeting, held last October, was designed to address issues of education and training affecting the future of psychology, recommend policies, and formulate strategies for addressing educational problems proactively and efficiently. The focus was on education and learning at all levels, grades K - 16. Participants divided into work groups to address 7 questions:

1. What competencies in the use of technology should every undergraduate major and graduate student in psychology have?
2. Should there be national standards for the psychol-

ogy undergraduate major, and what are the pros and cons?

3. Is there a core body of knowledge, skills, and related competencies that should be expected of all doctoral students in academic psychology?

4. What distinctive contribution to the health care work force does education and training in professional psychology provide?

5. What are the goals of pre-internship supervised practice training for doctoral students in professional psychology, and in what order should they be accomplished?

6. What should every preschool, elementary, and secondary teacher know and be able to apply from psychological science that is relevant to classroom teaching and learning?

7. Assuming that psychology was part of the curricu-

lum in public education, what knowledge should students have obtained by the end of elementary school, middle school, and high school? In what psychological/behavioral skills should students be competent at each of these levels?

At this first meeting, the work groups began to develop recommendations and implementation plans; they presented updates at the March APA consolidated governance meetings that I attended. Reports from the first year's efforts and other details can be viewed at <http://www.apa.org/ed/elc/home.html>. The next conference will take place Sept. 22-24, 2002. I plan to seek opportunities to emphasize the importance of gerontology-related content at all levels of psychology education. If you have questions, contact me at rmb@vt.edu.

particular instances sharing data may not be feasible. For example, studies with very small samples or those collecting particularly sensitive data should be shared only if stringent safeguards exist to ensure confidentiality and protect the identity of subjects. Applicants whose research will produce data that are not amenable to sharing will have to include in their applications reasons for not making the data available.

The policy notes that there are many ways to share data. Sometimes data are included in publications. Investigators may distribute data under their own auspices. Some investigators have placed data sets in public archives while others have put data on a web site, building in protection for privacy through the software while allowing analysis of the data. Restricted access data centers or data enclaves facilitate analyses of data too sensitive to share through other means. All of these options achieve the goals of data sharing.

Taken altogether, this is a significant change in expectations for research that will hopefully benefit the entire research enterprise. By going back to existing data, we move ahead to the future. Entirely new research directions and questions may be approached through the sharing, combining, or pooling of data sets from various sources. The goal of replication of findings may be more easily achieved. New instructional tools likewise may become available. The more cost-effective use of existing data through sharing should save research dollars and thereby free up funds for the collection of new data. This is the hope and intent.

Two-thirds of my presidential term is

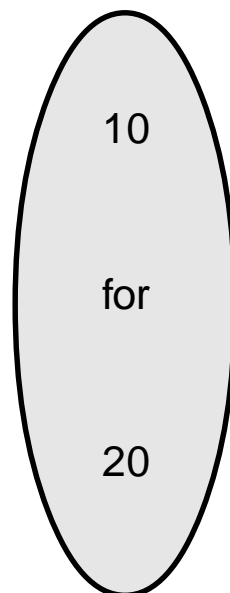

Teaching Tips: Integrating Aging

Within the next few months, expect to see a new APA book entitled "Integrating Aging Topics Into Psychology: A Practical Guide for Teaching Undergraduates" (Whitbourne & Cavanaugh, 2002). Information on the book will be available at the APA booth at the convention, and I have been promised a late September publication date.

In this edited volume, my co-editor John Cavanaugh and I have organized the contributions of specialists in fields ranging from neuropsychology to personal relationships who each address the potential for integrating aging into the content of courses within these areas. Many of the contributors presented the information contained in their chapters at past Division 20 Education Committee sponsored symposia organized around this theme. Based on the support that Karen Fingerman and Manfred Diehl provided us when they co-chaired the Education Committee, the book will be published as a collaborative effort with the Committee.

The need to integrate aging into the mainstream psychology curriculum is one that Division 20 members have been acutely aware of for years. Almost 25 years ago, in fact, the Education Committee organized a similar effort that eventually ended up as a publication by Springer Books in what was to be a series of "ACCESS" modules on teaching gerontology. One volume was published, but the series did not materialize. It was not until the APA Committee on Aging (CONA) invited me to put together a symposium on the topic that the project resurfaced. After what we felt was a successful symposium at the 2000 APA Convention, John and I felt that an edited volume published by APA Books would have the most success in getting the word out, and this is how we arrived at this latest compilation.

John and I are very excited about the book's upcoming publication. We feel that it will address the need of our discipline to incorporate knowledge about aging into the training of future psychologists. The book is also consistent with the mission of APA's CEMMRAT-2 (Commission on Ethnic Minority Membership, Recruitment, and Training-2) work group on incorporating diversity, including aging, into introductory psychology texts. The book's objective is to provide instructors of so-called "mainstream" psychology courses with concrete ways of infusing aging throughout their courses without having to undertake major revision of their existing syllabi. Ideally, all undergraduate

psychology programs would have courses specifically devoted to aging, but in reality, many departments do not have the resources to provide such courses.

Each chapter contributor provides up-to-date reviews of the literature on the chapter's topic with regard to aging and then gives practical recommendations for how to incorporate this information into the course. In addition to this substantive knowledge, each author also describes in detail multimedia approaches and class exercises that will help students gain insight into the impact of aging on that particular field.

These experiential components of the chapters will also help students retain the knowledge and insight they gain as they continue to pursue training in their own particular fields.

Of course, in writing this article for the Division 20 Newsletter, I realize that I am "preaching to the choir." As I stated earlier, the readers of this Newsletter do not need to be convinced that our courses need to include aging! The real success of this volume will lie in its sales to colleagues outside of the division. Since John and I are donating the profits to Division 20, I have no qualms about blatantly publicizing the book here. My hope is that you will inform your colleagues and encourage the curriculum committees of your departments to invest in "Integrating Aging." It will be an investment that will pay off ultimately to our students and the profession.

APA 2002 Chicago: Convention News

Changing Times

This has been a year of change in the APA Convention. The convention is shorter, and organized along several innovative new "tracks". This makes the entire Convention program tighter and more compressed, but also arguably makes for a more exciting experience, with a higher density of offerings at any given time.

From the APA web site: "In response to members' requests, this year's convention will be shorter (Thursday through Sunday). Ninety percent of the meetings will be held under one roof - McCormick Place, one of the largest convention centers in the country. There will be three levels of programming: division programming, topical tracks, and plenary sessions, as well as more opportunities to earn continuing professional education credits." Division 20 (under the direction of President Ron Abeles) helped organize a topical track with a cluster of divisions concerned with Psychologists in Public Service, Rehabilitation, Clinical Neuropsychology, and the Advancement of Pharmacotherapy. This "cluster track" will include presentations by Division Fellows/Past Presidents Paul Baltes and Denise Park.

The allocation of program time to inter-divisional cluster programming, and more APA-wide plenary sessions, combined with a compressed APA Convention schedule (we will have about two fewer days than in recent years) means that all divisions received fewer division-specific program hours to fill. Although this meant that a number of potentially interesting poster and symposium proposals could not be accepted, it also meant that many accepted posters and symposia will have shorter lengths (one hour has now become the modal session length). Despite these time constraints, I believe that this has led to an exciting, fast-paced convention program with broad, diverse foci.

Particularly exciting for me is the fact that this year Division 20 programming is just the "tip of the iceberg" of aging-related programming at APA. Division 20 events, as well as other program items of interest, are listed on the following pages. Please note that many other divisions have asked us to co-list special programs of relevance to adult development and aging. I believe that this may be a record-high year for co-listed programs and reflects the extent to which aging-relevant issues have come to permeate psychological science.

Convention Highlights

We will have two poster sessions this year. The first is somewhat more cognitive in focus. It is entitled *Cognition, Neuropsychology, Depression, and Psychosocial Interventions* and will occur on Friday 8/23 at 10:00 am. The second is more socio-emotional in focus; this poster session, entitled *Well-Being, Personality and Coping, Stereotypes, Families, and Education*, will occur Saturday 8/24 at 12:00 noon.

Symposia cover a wide variety of themes this year, including *Aging Research and NIMH—Highlights and Future Trends*, *Close Relationships and Interdependence in Motivation, Cognition, and Health*, *Baby Boomers Aren't Babies Anymore: Contemporary Perspectives on Midlife, Psychological Functioning and Work Across the Life Course*, *Enhancing Quality of Life in Geriatric Residential Care*, and *Stress and Resources in Mid and Late Life*. Among the distinguished speakers, discussants, and organizers of these sessions are Carolyn Aldwin, Toni Antonucci, Cindy Berg, Laura Carstensen, Manfred Diehl, Ravenna Helson, James Jackson, Carol Magai, Jacqui Smith, Mary Ann Parris Stephens, Susan Krauss Whitbourne, and Sherry Willis.

This year, we are fortunate to have two additional co-sponsored symposia. Both of these received a "donation" of program hours from partner divisions—an expression of great generosity in a year when each Division had fewer program hours than in previous years. Division 33, the Division on Mental Retardation and Developmental Disabilities, has co-sponsored a symposium entitled *Aging—The Challenge of Developmental Disability*, organized by our incoming President, Harvey Sterns. That session will occur early in the morning of Thursday August 22. In addition, Division 51, the Society for the Psychological Study of Men and Masculinity, has sponsored a symposium entitled *Men in Relationships*, organized by Victoria Bedford, also on Thursday morning.

end by 2003. At the present time, there is no assurance that the income from Communications will increase sufficiently in 2002 to cover our budgeted expenses, so there is no choice but to reduce expenditures throughout the Association. The CEO, the Finance Office, the senior staff and the Board of Directors have been working to do that, but solving the problem will require immediate and sustained cutbacks in our activities and some modification in the way in which we conduct our business. The budgets in all directorates and major offices have already been cut, and all new positions and replacements frozen until further notice. However, it is likely that the reductions already made by the Directorates/offices will not be sufficient to solve the problem. We will all have to work together (management, finance committee, Council and boards) to find ways to steady the ship, and it will take a concentrated joint effort if we are to be successful.

To this end, the Board is looking at ways to further economize across the organization without reducing member services. For example, one of our largest expenses each year is staff support and expense reimbursement for the many meetings that involve bringing members in from all over the country. The value of these meetings is immense, but until we balance our budget, we will probably have to do a part of our business in other ways. The Board of

Directors is taking the lead by eliminating the meetings of some of its task forces and work groups for this year and next year, and sharply cutting back on its own meeting expenses. For example, the Board's retreat meetings for fall 2002 and spring 2003, which were scheduled to be out of town, will be held in Washington, DC, resulting in major cost savings.

Other meetings will have to be reviewed and reevaluated as well. The consolidated board and committee meetings are a major expense. The Board of Directors will soon have to face the possibility of canceling those meetings for the fall of 2002. Canceling these meetings will reduce the anticipated deficit by about \$400,000 in direct costs for 2002, and much more in staffing costs. Until our financial status improves, it will probably be necessary to find new ways to carry out some of our governance functions. At their June meetings, the Finance Committee and the Board of Directors will consider some ways of continuing the vital work of our governance system without having so many costly face to face meetings, and will propose other economies as well.

I welcome your suggestions and recommendations. At this time we need creative solutions to these current, and hopefully temporary, budgetary constraints on our activities and functions.

I am confident that we can get APA back on solid financial footing by all of us working collaboratively to make our Association activities and operations as efficient as possible, and to allocate our resources only where they will yield the greatest benefits to our members. I also realize that Council is deeply committed to balancing the budget and preserving our assets, and I wanted to assure you that your Board of Directors takes that responsibility very seriously.

APA President Zimbardo -- Letter on APA Finances

To: Council of Representatives
Date: May 17, 2002

As all of you are aware from Jack McKay's presentation at the February Council meeting, 2001 was a very bad financial year for APA. The good news is that our dues payments for 2002 seem to be holding up well and the initial paper losses in the stock market immediately after 9/11 have gradually been recovering.

The bad news is that we sustained a large deficit for 2001 as Jack had warned us. This deficit is due principally to a shortfall in revenues for 2001. Although the income from Communications was higher in 2001 than in 2000, it was not as high as had been projected. This shortfall was identified too late in the fall to permit a significant reduction in expenses. The 2001 audit is now complete, and the 2001 loss from APA operations was \$5,962,165. This results, of course, in a reduction in our net worth. We are fortunate to have a substantial net worth which serves as a cushion in bad years, but we cannot continue to sustain such large losses in subsequent years.

A major portion of this downturn in revenues is due to the shift from print products to electronic products and increasing competition. Sales of print products are shrinking and sales of electronic products are not growing fast enough to fill the gap. Another aspect of the problem is that we have not been able to control our spending and set priorities as an organization. Our expenses continue to increase each year, and we have traditionally called upon Communications to make up the difference. The problem is a familiar one to government, businesses and many families: our expenses are growing faster than our income, which means that we must begin systematic efforts to start spending LESS. The Finance Committee has been warning about this danger for some time; now the time has come for us to heed that warning and do something constructive about it.

The current focus must be on 2002 and 2003. The Council directed that every effort be made to return to a balanced budget by 2004, and that we make progress toward that
